In 2021, the State Bar of Arizona opposed no bills.

Proactive activities included two subjects:

- SB1230, the limited liability cleanup bill identical to SB1114 from the 2020 session which did not pass due to the COVID shutdown. The bill contained non-controversial technical corrections that required very little direct lobbying and passed both chambers unanimously; and
- 2) The Probate & Trust section's proposed spendthrift trust bill. The lobbying activity consisted of one meeting in January exploring whether Senator Warren Petersen would hear such a bill in committee, one meeting in late fall with Senator Pace regarding sponsorship of the bill in the 2022 session, and communications with Legislative Council regarding preparing a new bill folder for the spendthrift trust issue.
